- at least 72 hours in MA and RI Know what's below. (excluding weekends and legal holidays)
- at least two full working days in NY (excluding the date of your request, weekends and legal holidays).
- Wait the required time in your state before you dig. It's the law!
- If you plan to excavate within 20 feet of a high-pressure pipeline, National Grid MUST be onsite during the excavation.
- Never use pipeline markers as a substitute for notifying 811.

Pipeline markers indicate the general location of underground high-pressure gas transmission pipelines and some distribution lines. They are usually freestanding, but they may also be found on utility poles in urban areas. For security reasons, these markers do not show the exact location, depth or number of gas pipelines in the area.

#### What to do if you suspect a gas leak:

Warn others and LEAVE the area quickly, DO NOT smoke or operate electrical switches or appliances. These items may produce a spark that could ignite leaking gas and cause an explosion. **CALL 911** and **National Grid** immediately. Provide the exact location, including cross streets, **DO NOT** go back inside your home or building until National Grid personnel say it is safe.
