This FREE service will arrange for marking of buried natural gas lines and other utilities so that you can work a safe distance away from them. Every digging project requires 811 - even small or shallow jobs.

Five steps for safe excavation: Massachusetts

Plan your job and pre-mark your dig area with white paint, flags and/or stakes.



- Notify 811 before any excavation starts:
 - Dial 811 or 1-888-DIG-SAFE (344-7233).
 - Request a Dig Safe ticket at digsafe.com.
- Wait the required time for utilities to locate and mark their lines before you dig:
- Wait at least 72 hours excluding weekends and legal holidays.
- Do not dig until lines have been marked or you have been notified the area is clear of utilities.
- Respect the marks when digging.
- Dig with care and follow hand-excavating rules.

Always contact your state 811 center before diaging and for the most current requirements.

If you contact a natural gas pipeline: Warn others, leave the area guickly and stay far away until National Grid personnel say it is safe to return. Do NOT use matches, lighters, cigarettes (including e-cigarettes or vape pens), light switches or anything electrical - not even a phone or garage door opener. Leave the excavation open, and do not try to stop the flow of gas. From a safe location, call 911 and National Grid immediately. Call us even if there is no visible damage to the pipeline. Report the incident to your supervisor and also notify 811, Excavators are required by law to call 911 if gas is escaping.
