# A message from Tim Graham



April is National Safe Digging Month. It's a time when many of us start planning spring and summer projects and is a great opportunity to highlight the importance of our company's damage prevention initiatives. These initiatives include a fundamental reminder for both excavators and homeowners to contact the free 811 service well in advance of starting any digging. By following this important step,

individuals can ensure facility owners and operators accurately locate and mark underground lines, thereby reducing the risk of accidental damage.

Did you know that every 9 minutes an underground utility line is damaged because someone decided to dig without first notifying 811? The risk of injury or even death is real. Beyond these devastating risks, consider the costs of repairs, fines and property damage. Whether you are putting in a fence, planting a tree or building a deck, learning the locations of underground utility lines before you dig will help ensure public safety across our communities. Know what's below!

During the month of April, we will be distributing reminders to educate the public on the importance of notifying the 811 service before digging, respecting the locate marks and following safe digging practices around our gas pipelines. Please join me in sharing our damage prevention messages with family, friends, coworkers and contractors that you may see working in our community.

We all know how important it is to prevent incidents to underground utilities and maintain reliable gas service for National Grid customers. Thank you for doing your part for safe digging!

# March is Workplace Eye Wellness Month



Whether your work involves inspecting pipelines, operating equipment, or using devices and computer screens, your eyes are vital on the job. Workplace Eye Wellness Month is a great time to learn to protect your vision and prevent eye injuries.

Stay alert for these common eye hazards:

- Airborne debris and dust.
- Cleaning agents and hazardous materials.
- Exposure to the sun's ultraviolet (UV) rays.
- Bright lights and prolonged screen usage.

Protect your eyes on the job:

- ✓ Wear proper PPE. Use safety glasses, goggles or face shields.
- ✓ Keep hands clean. Avoid rubbing your eyes after handling tools or chemicals.
- ✓ Wear sunglasses outdoors. UV protection is essential even on cloudy days.
- ✓ Take screen breaks. Use the 20-20-20 rule: Every 20 minutes, look 20 feet away for 20 seconds.

Be sure to report and respond to all eye injuries. Know where to find eye wash stations and seek immediate care if needed.

## **Ladder safety**

### Preventing workplace injuries

Ladders are essential in our industry. Unfortunately, improper ladder usage often leads to serious injuries. March is Ladder Safety Month, a great time to reinforce safe practices.

Avoid these common ladder hazards:

- Skipping inspections. Damaged ladders increase risks.
- Unstable setup. Uneven surfaces can cause falls.
- Overreaching. Leaning too far shifts balance.
- Exceeding weight limits. Carrying heavy tools can lead to collapse.

Follow these ladder safety best practices:

- Inspect before use. Check for cracks, loose rungs and stability.
- ✓ Set up on solid ground. Use level surfaces and secure footing.
- Maintain three points of contact. Keep two hands and one foot (or vice versa) on the ladder.
- ✓ Use the right ladder. Choose the proper height and weight capacity.

## **April is Safe Dig Month**

### Call 811 before you dig!

Unsafe digging practices damage buried utility lines every day, interrupting critical services and all too often resulting in fires, explosions and serious injuries. Safe Dig Month reminds us to follow these best practices to prevent injuries, outages and costly repairs:

- 1. Pre-mark your dig area with white paint, flags and/or stakes.
- 2. Call 811 or make an online dig ticket request before any excavation starts.
- **3. Wait the required time** for utilities to locate and mark their lines.
- **4. Respect all locate marks** and maintain them while digging.
- **5. Dig with care** and physically locate marked utility lines by potholing.
- **6. Report all damage.** If you hit a line, leave the area and report it immediately.

- ✓ Save energy. Turn off unused lights, appliances and equipment.
- Reduce waste. Recycle and dispose of hazardous materials properly.
